From the Revd Sally

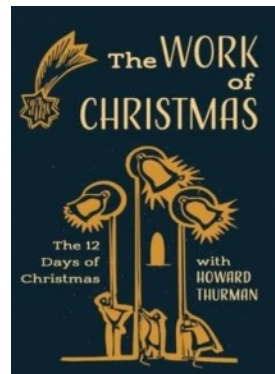


Dear Friends

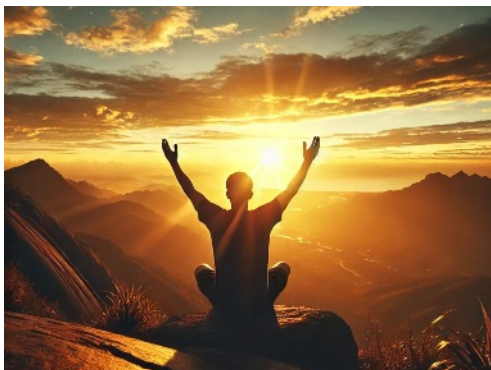

What, oh what, is that person's name?!

Do your New Year Resolutions include the forlorn hope that you will be better at remembering people's names in 2026?

Many of us – and not only those of the older generation – have difficulty remembering names. It's not just TV personalities and so on, but people we meet in the street. We know exactly who they are, we see them every week in church or the supermarket, we know what job they do and which school their children go to. But as for their name – it's a blank.

Help is at hand, however. Not to solve the problem, but at least to name it. 'Anomic aphasia' is the clinical name for the inability to remember a name, even when we can remember everything else about someone.

There is also the strange truth that the cure for anomic aphasia comes spontaneously, often in the middle of the night, when that elusive identity pops unbidden into our memory. We must be sure, of course, to put the light on and write it down, because for sure it will be gone again with the morning light!

The Government's Climate Action Plan

The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it. *1 Corinthians 10:26*

In 2019 the previous Conservative government set a legally-binding target to reduce the UK's greenhouse gas emissions to net-zero by 2050. Under the Climate Change Act, the government has to produce – and update at regular intervals – a plan to achieve this target in 5-year stages.

The present government's *Carbon Budget Growth and Delivery Plan* was published in the autumn, covering the period up to 2037, by which time carbon emissions must be 77% below their 1990 level. This is going to affect everyone, so I hope that 'in touch' readers will be interested to see some of the plan's highlights.

The plan seeks to accelerate the move to a clean energy economy, aiming to support 400,000 additional clean energy jobs by 2030 and to lever in over £50 billion in private sector green investment. A core focus is investing in UK production of low-carbon energy so as to increase energy security and to reduce energy costs for homes and businesses.

Here are some of the key policies and proposals.

Power: Plans to almost double electricity generation by 2035, with

targets of 63% from renewable and nuclear sources by 2030 and 98% by 2035. Gas-fired power plants will be retrofitted with carbon capture technology. The public energy company 'Great British Energy' will be responsible for a wide range of clean energy generation projects.

Heating Homes: Upgrading homes for 5 million families through the Warm Homes Plan, promoting heat pumps and insulation, and expanding heat networks. New homes will be built to high energy-efficiency standards with low-carbon heating and solar panels.

Road Transport: Promoting the uptake of zero-emission vehicles (ZEV) through the ZEV mandate, which aims for 80% of new cars and 70% of new vans sold to be zero-emission by 2030, rising to 100% by 2035. The plan highlights continued investment in charging infrastructure, with funding for 100,000 new public charging points.

Air Travel: Encouraging the use of sustainable aviation fuels (SAF) which reduce emissions by mixing fuel made from non-fossil sources like waste into the normal jet fuel. Under the SAF mandate, the proportion of such fuels should rise from 2% this year to 5% by 2030.

Industry: Encouraging measures to reduce waste generation, increase process efficiency, and promote the reuse, recycling and remanufacturing of materials. Providing funding for carbon capture, utilisation and storage, and for hydrogen projects.

Nature: Supporting new woodland creation to absorb carbon, with a target to more than double tree planting to 37,000 hectares per year by 2030. Peatlands will be restored, aiming for 55% of peatlands to be in a natural or rewetted state by 2040. There will be a full ban on the sale of horticultural peat.

Agriculture: Promoting the creation of new woodlands on farmland and a 40% increase in hedgerows. The Sustainable Farming Incentive will pay farmers for integrating trees and shrubs into their land. They will also be encouraged to diversify their incomes by growing energy crops or installing renewable energy.

Waste: Sending biodegradable household waste (food, paper, wood etc) to landfill should be virtually eliminated by 2028, through reforms in waste collection and packaging, and by extending requirements to recycle such materials. The long-term goal is to eliminate avoidable plastic waste by 2042 and to achieve zero avoidable waste by 2050.

Getting to know....

It is a pleasure to be able to introduce myself to you with a brief history, or an overview more aptly, of my journey to this point. I am a third-year ordinand with St Mellitus college in Chelmsford and I will be with you in worship as I conclude my training and prepare for ordination next year.

I grew up and still live in Broomfield with my wife. I have two children who are old enough to have flown the nest (it never fails to surprise me when I think of how the time has flown). During my childhood I grew up in a Methodist home and, as such, my brother and I went to Sunday school every week without fail under instruction from my mother. Attending church was a tradition that I quickly forgot as soon as I was able to exercise free will.

It is at this point that I will jump forward many years, not only to keep the length of this piece manageable for the reader, but also because I am happy to chat further over coffee. I was asked randomly to attend the Methodist Church in Broomfield for the anniversary of 100 years. I had some pictures that were requested. At the service the Revd Martin Turner from Westminster Central Hall was preaching on Romans and he spoke directly to me. He spoke so effectively about the forgiveness afforded us in Christ that, as a result of this service, 'And Can It Be' is one of my favourite hymns and Romans 8 my favourite passage. On the 6th March 2011 I became a Christian and a couple of weeks later I felt a strong call to ministry.

* **The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity** is an important time for the Church to reflect on the progress being made on the ecumenical journey. This year the prayers and reflections are from the Armenian Apostolic Church. These resources draw upon centuries-old traditions of prayer and petitions used by the Armenian people, along with hymns that originated in the ancient monasteries and churches of Armenia. They extend an invitation to draw upon this shared Christian heritage and to delve more deeply into our fellowship in Christ, which unites Christians worldwide.

2025 Green Lifestyle Questionnaire Results

Thank you very much to the 91 people – a record number! – who filled in our latest annual eco questionnaire in the autumn. There was a good range of responses from people who come to services in the church, Sunday Special, and Children-in-Church, plus a few from people who are connected with the church through online services or in other ways (e.g. as magazine readers or through Connect Café). The results are in!

Using Energy

- Most people try to save energy at home, and use LED bulbs in some or all of their lights.
- 27% have renewable electricity or buy their electricity on a renewable tariff – but 42% don't know whether their electricity is green. 9% have solar panels.

Reduce or Re-use, and Recycle what's left

- Everyone says that they try to reduce or re-use their waste, and to recycle what can't be re-used – 92% always and 8% sometimes.

Getting Around

- Less than half (44%) usually walk or cycle to church services and events (fewer than in the 2024 responses).
- Car ownership is quite high – 54% of households have one car, and 26% have two or more cars.
- 61% of those with cars try to reduce their car use when they can, and almost all of the others do this sometimes.
- 20% have electric and/or hybrid cars (compared with 17% in the 2024 survey).
- Car ownership is higher among younger people, and they are much less likely to walk or cycle to church.

Caring for the Environment

- Everyone enjoys visiting green spaces and being in the countryside.
- 80% are interested in the natural world and how they can help wildlife, and the rest say they are interested sometimes.
- 83% of those with a garden have some elements to make it more wildlife-friendly, and 44% have most of what's needed.
- 29% are regularly involved with activities to help the environment, and another 23% are involved sometimes (slightly fewer than in 2024).

Eating Well

- 57% try to buy British/locally-grown or organic food, and another 38% do this sometimes (more than in 2024).
- 34% like to buy Fairtrade goods where possible, with a further 54% doing this sometimes.
- 24% have changed their diet to eat less meat and dairy products, with another 48% doing this sometimes.

And more ...

- 96% see living a 'green' lifestyle as an important part of their Christian faith (an increase from 87% in 2024).
- Over half support a charity which cares for the environment.
- 32% have some or all of their banking or savings accounts with ethical organisations which generally don't fund activities which harm the environment – but 52% don't know whether their providers are ethical.
- 15% have measured their 'environmental footprint' in the last year.

It's good to see the progress we are making in living greener lifestyles, as well as the ways we can go further in caring for God's world. Several responses included additional comments which the Eco Church Group will consider carefully.

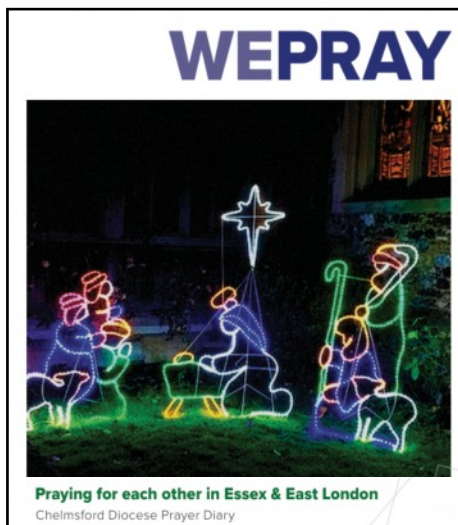
I am no longer my own but yours.

They're talking about us.....

Two publications in the Chelmsford Diocese have been reporting on what goes on here at All Saints'. "*Climate Action Now*" is the monthly diocesan environment newsletter about ECO matters and "*We Pray*" is a quarterly prayer diary.

- June 2025 - All Saints' achievement of an Eco Church Gold Award was the subject of a long feature with photo, based on our news release. The environment pages of the diocesan website carried the same article, and a shorter piece formed the 'good news story' in the 30th June issue of *The View*. (The gold award was also in the *Essex Chronicle* and our local ward councillors' newsletter.)
- August 2025 - In *Climate Action Now*, All Saints' 'Days of Creation Walk' was made available as an editable resource for other churches to adapt and use during this year's Season of Creation, at the same time publicising All Saints' own walk held on 7th September.
- September 2025 - *Climate Action Now* covered our churchyard gold award celebration service, with a picture of AD Jonathan and Marie Goldman MP with the Rector and members of the Eco Church Group.
- December 2025 - In the diocese's *Enviro Advent Calendar*, the 7th December entry was from All Saints', titled 'Reaching gold - and beyond', with a picture of the plastic bottles cross sculpture.
- December 2025 - *Climate Action Now* and *The View* both carried links to December's *in touch* Eco Church article on how to have a Greener Christmas.
- June to August 2024 - highlighted Sunday Special and invited pray for our ministry team and congregation and all involved in the Sunday Special service.
- September to November 2025 – celebrated our Eco Church Gold Award and included a picture of our ECO Church Team.
- December 2025 to February 2026 – mentioned our Church Magazine winning a prize. Prayers were invited for all parish magazine editors and church communications officers. May God bless their work as they share the Good News through parish magazines and all forms of church communications across Essex and East London.

THE PURPOSE DRIVEN DECLARATION

Several years ago we heard about Rick Warren, a church leader in America. He started a church in his home and, from a very small beginning, the church, Saddleback, grew into one of the largest. He wrote the best selling books, The Purpose Driven Church and The Purpose Driven Life, which emphasised five biblical purposes for every Christian and every church, WORSHIP, FELLOWSHIP, DISCIPLESHIP, MINISTRY and EVANGELISM. Printed below is a statement that we both signed up for.

Today I am stepping across the line. I'm tired of waffling and I'm finished with waffling. I've made my choice, the verdict is in and my decision is irrevocable. I'm going God's way. There is no turning back now!

I will live the rest of my life serving God's purposes with God's people on God's planet for God's glory. I will use my life to celebrate His presence, cultivate His character, participate in His family, demonstrate His love and communicate His word.

Since my past has been forgiven, and I have a purpose for living, and a home awaiting in heaven, I refuse to waste any more time or energy on shallow living, petty thinking, trivial talking, thoughtless doing, useless regretting, hurtful resenting or faithless worrying. Instead I will magnify God, grow to maturity, serve in ministry, and fulfil my mission in the membership of His family.

Because this life is preparation for the next, I will value worship over wealth, we over me, character over comfort, service over status, and people over possessions, position and pleasures. I know what

matters most and I'll give it all I'll got. I'll do the best I can with what I have for Jesus Christ today.

I won't be captivated by culture, manipulated by critics, motivated by praise, frustrated by problems, debilitated by temptation, or intimidated by the devil. I'll keep running my race with my eyes on the goal, not the side-lines or those running by me. When times get tough and I get tired, I won't back up, back off, back down, back out or backside.

I just keep moving forward by God's grace. I'm Spirit-led, purpose-driven and mission-focused so I cannot be bought, I will not be compromised and I shall not quit until I finish the race.

I'm a trophy of God's amazing grace so I will be gracious to everyone, grateful for every day and generous with everything that God entrusts to me.

To my Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, I say: However, Whenever, Wherever and Whatever You ask me to do, my answer in advance is yes!

Our January 8th meeting will be about Chelmsford Camera Club.

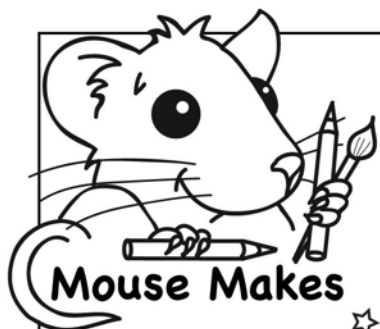

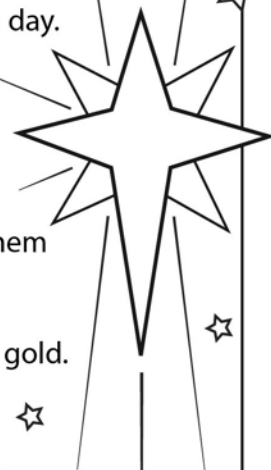
WISE MEN FROM THE EAST

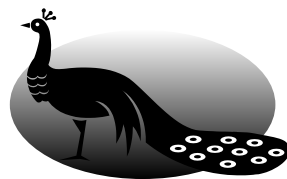
