From the Revd Sally



Dear Friends

Welcome to March, the month of new life, new beginnings and celebrating the hope we have in Christ as we travel through Lent to the foot of the cross.

As I write this piece General Synod is meeting for the first time with our new Archbishop of Canterbury at the helm. I thought I would share parts of her address which I think speaks to us all at this time of reflection and discussion, regarding the direction of mission and growth at All Saints' Church.

The congregation and outreach of All Saints' has grown over the last few years and we are thankful to God for that. However, this brings new challenges, in particular with our worshipping space, its flexibility, accessibility and the cost of heating it. There is also more pressure on the modest group of volunteers who give their time and talents to run the finances, upkeep the building, plan events, raise much needed funds, and serve the people attending the services and weekly activities.

Archbishop Sarah said:



"I stand here among you by no means for the first time, but for the first time as the Archbishop of Canterbury. It is a humbling privilege to be called to serve in this role. It brings with it huge weight of responsibility, at a time when people love to remind me that the church faces significant challenges."

All Saints' Church has a responsibility in this parish and community which is both a privilege and a burden. We seek to be relevant in the lives of people, but we live in a society where there is much competing noise so that we cannot always be heard. We represent, at grass roots level, a Church that has fundamental theological disagreements, lack of funding, lack of volunteers as well as a lack of clergy. We live in stormy times, but Archbishop Sarah said:

"When the wind and the waves are rocking the boat, I am reminded that what I need to do is to focus on Christ, who calms the waters and stills the wind. With your help and with God's grace, I pray that I am able to approach this ministry with calm, consistency and compassion – as we seek to be what the Church has for so long been: a stable presence in an unstable world."

From the Rector continued

“Do, please, continue to pray for me in the months and years to come, as I will always pray for you. I do not carry my new responsibilities alone. We serve God’s church together, lay and ordained; uniquely reflecting God’s image into one another; offering our richly varied gifts and perspectives; aspiring to treat one another with love, dignity and respect; setting our faces towards Christ and remembering his prayer that we should be one in our love for God and of one another.”

In changing times, we need to look to the unchanging God, who stands steadfast, urging us forward, because standing still is not an option. Archbishop Sarah continues:

“At my Confirmation of Election, I was deeply moved to be asked, during the Charge which was given to me, to ‘help the Church love itself more ... believing that its best days are still to come’. And I do believe that this is true. Through every challenge, our hope in Christ remains - and our confidence in the Gospel, as good news for our nation and for God’s world, is not shaken.

“I pray that the thread running through my time as Archbishop will be that of nurturing confidence and hope, rooted not in institutions, but in God and the Gospel of Jesus Christ. With our confidence in God, we can believe that indeed, the best is yet to come for the church that we love and nurture, and therefore for the world that the church is called to serve.”

The best is yet to come, what joy that statement conjures up and what hope that sets among us as we strive to be a relevant, strong and servant presence in Springfield.

Archbishop Sarah finished her address with a message of hope and courage:

“It is sometimes said that hope is a muscle that we must build and develop. In the seemingly impossible situations we see around the world, we must flex the muscle of hope, strengthening our sense of God’s work and presence in the world. This does not mean that we deny the challenges that are in front of us – the challenges of inequality and injustice, the volatility of global politics, the climate crisis and more – but it means we can say with confidence that God is in the midst of us.

“Reflecting on the parable of the pearl of great price, we might recall that pearls do not come out of nowhere. Pearls are formed over a long period of time because of grit in the oyster. There is no pearl without grit.”

So let us embrace hope, face coming challenges with grit and form a beautiful pearl here in our community.

All Saints' Lent Course 2026

'Resurrection Journeys'



This year's Lent course begins on **Tuesday 24th February** and will continue for six weeks until Tuesday 31st March, so if you're interested in coming we would love to see you! We will get together for an hour **every Tuesday morning from 11.00am until 12 noon** in the church centre, with a cup of coffee or tea, for prayers, a Bible reading, a video reflection, and conversation about each week's theme. You don't need to do any special preparation or reading! Just come along and find out what God has in store for us through this year's Lent course.

As Revd Sally explained in February's *'in touch'* magazine, during 2026 all the churches in Chelmsford Diocese will be seeking to discover how God is calling us to be the church for our own time in our own community, so that we can build up the church for mission and service. This process of prayer, exploration, reflection and conversation – which the diocese is calling *'Sustaining Ministry'* – will begin with 100 days of prayer across the diocese, starting on Ash Wednesday 18th February.

Our Lent course will be running alongside the 100 days of prayer. It is called *'Resurrection Journeys'* because – just like the disciples on the road to Emmaus – churches today are journeying along a road which can be both a road of difficult times and uncertain futures, and a road towards and alongside the light and joy of Jesus' resurrection, the one who accompanies us even when we do not know it.

The Bible readings chosen for the course lead us to reflect on different ways that resurrection hope can inspire our church journeys.

- **24th February:** Matthew 4:1-11 (Jesus in the wilderness) – how God's love and God's word can sustain us through hard times
- **3rd March:** John 3:1-17 (Nicodemus comes to Jesus by night) – letting the Spirit lead us into a new understanding
- **10th March:** John 4:7-42 (the Samaritan woman at the well) – crossing boundaries to share the good news of Jesus
- **17th March:** 1 Samuel 16:1-23 (the prophet Samuel anoints David as the future king of Israel) – trying to see one another as God sees us
- **24th March:** John 11:1-44 (the raising of Lazarus) – having faith in God through times of loss and grief
- **31st March:** Acts 8:1-8, 26-40 (the apostle Philip meets an Ethiopian eunuch on a wilderness road) – having the courage to persevere and respond to God's call

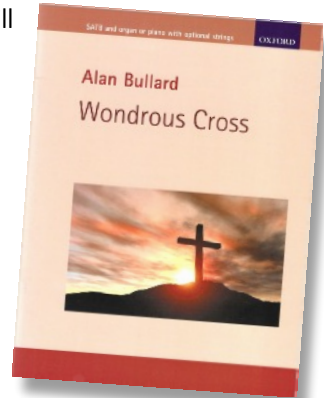

All Saints' Tower Bell Ringers

I wanted to share with the church congregation what the bell ringers have been doing in the last 12 months. We ring each Sunday morning for the 10.30am service and practise on Monday at 7.30pm. We also rang for 2 weddings in 2025.

For notable events we have been ringing quarter peals on a Sunday evening. Details of these are put on the church notice board so the congregation can see. Quarter peals last around 40 minutes and are a test of accuracy in ringing and ability to concentrate for a longer period of time than on a Sunday morning.

In June we had our annual ringing outing to the area southeast of Cambridge. This was a good day out for all involved and included a pub lunch. We were assisted by ringers from other churches so that we could ring more complicated things than we would be able to on a Sunday.

Currently we are teaching 2 learners so they can improve their ringing for services. Learners are taught following the association of ringing teachers' method. This helps to standardise bell ringing teaching across the country. We have trained ART teachers at Springfield. Our learners also have the opportunity to visit other churches so they can ring on different bells. All church bells have a



different feel and weight. It is good while learning, to ring at as many different churches as possible. In the Essex area there is also an annual ringing course, which lasts 3 days and the learners can focus on one area of their ringing to improve. We recommend our learners attend the course as it is a great opportunity to practise ringing. There are many experienced ringers to assist at the course.

The Springfield annual bell ringing dinner was well attended and enjoyed by all. It is always a popular evening.

We are carrying out regular maintenance on the bells so we can continue to ring them on a Sunday morning. We are grateful to have experienced ringers who perform this maintenance.

We also host a more advanced regular practice for local bell ringers who want to

improve their 6-bell ringing. These practices are well attended. Sometimes visiting groups of bell ringers from other churches come to All Saints to ring our bells. It is enjoyable to visit different churches while also getting the opportunity to ring.

We rang at many additional services over the Christmas period including 9 lessons and carols, Christmas Eve services and Christmas Day. I feel Christmas is an important time to ring the bells so that the visitors to All Saints' Springfield can enjoy the sound of the bells.

Due to two of our bell ringers recently quitting bell ringing due to having other commitments, we are looking to recruit new bell ringers. 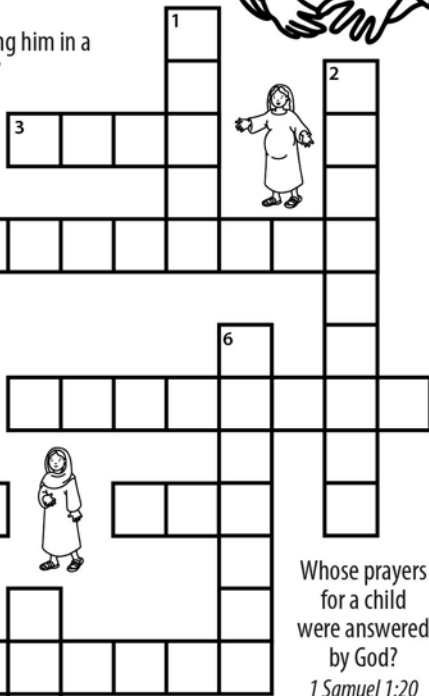

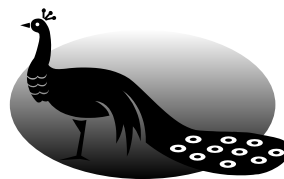
